#1 ATTA Develops Guide Qualifications and Performance Standards

The Adventure Travel Trade Association (ATTA) has developed a non-binding set of guide Qualifications and performance Standards. Read more and follow the links below.

(SEATTLE) February 23, 2016 – In an effort to support the adventure travel industry as it continues to expand and professionalize, the Adventure Travel Trade Association has facilitated the creation of the industry's first ever Adventure Travel Guide Qualification and Performance Standard (or "Guide Standard"). A volunteer industry working group developed the standard between the months of November 2014 and January 2016. Working group participants came from 15 countries and included guides, business owners, and industry partners. "I'm pleased ATTA could lead this process," said Christina Beckmann, ATTA's AdventureEDU and Research Director, "This is a prime example of the type of foundational industry support the ATTA is positioned to provide. We look forward to seeing the standard take root and flourish."

At this time, the Guide Standard shall not be regulated by the ATTA or any other organization. Governments, destination managers, and company owners are encouraged to refer to the Guide Standard when evaluating the quality and performance of their own guides and when selecting appropriate training programs. Additionally, individuals and companies are encouraged to review the standard and <u>officially sign the document</u>, signaling their support and intention to adhere to the best practice components of adventure travel guiding.

The Guide Standard will be overseen going forward by a Governance Board, a volunteer group made up of guides and industry professionals. The Governance Board will observe the

standard's implementation around the world and maintain the standard, providing revisions and updates as necessary.

"With the publication of the Adventure Travel Guide Qualification and Performance Standard, the adventure travel world now has a complete standard for businesses to align with and for guides to train towards," said Myles Farnbank, Head of Guides & Training at Wilderness Scotland (also a Governance Board Member), "However, this is the just the beginning and the Governance Board is very keen to engage and hear ongoing feedback, along with the ways in which destinations, businesses and guides are engaging with the standard."

The Adventure Travel Trade Association is helping to raise the bar for professional adventure travel guides. In addition to helping organize the development of the Guide Standard, the ATTA is proud to make Guide Training available through its AdventureEDU program. This program has been developed by the professional guides, trainers, and adventure travel operators at the forefront of shaping guide standards.
